#### G'day from the Chief Crows

It's hard to believe our Festival is now five years old. Seven years ago, we started our planning. The first year was a learning curve as things surfaced day to day. Today, thanks to incredible support from our flock members and volunteers, this event has become known on the grey nomad calendar as something *unique* and *super-friendly*.

This year's program sees some entertainers returning by popular demand, *Darren Carr*, *Neil Smith* and *Jamie Way* (through his alter-ego P-Elvis). A warm first time welcome to *Mike McClellan*, *Marcus Holden*, *Lisa Crouch*, *Jackie Kerin*, *Sarah DePasquale* and *Bob Magor*.

This diversity of talent will keep you entertained while you relax in possibly the last time we might utilise the Crow Central Marquee. If all goes to plan ACTA, the owners of our venue, will have a magnificent conference and convention centre for 2018, air conditioned and seating 1100 to 1200 people in comfort.

Many of these professionals will also share their knowledge with you through various seminars from story telling to instrumental music, from poetry to bedtime stories (and – yes - you can come in your pyjamas but bring your own mug if you want a cup of cocoa that will be available).

**Chief Crows Jim Haynes** and **Grant Luhrs** will entertain you in a variety of forms from the morning show to seminars, from poetry to making your own audio or music CD.

**Rob Nichols** is our resident ukulele and guitar tutor, with able assistants to help even the total novice. In addition there are jam sessions/singalongs each afternoon – if you can't sing, don't worry you can still strum along. Rob has also recorded his first CD of guitar music and that will be launched officially on Thursday night at the Crow Concert. It will be available for sale from our Merchandise Shop.

Another CD launch for that night is *The Essential Jim Haynes* (20 songs you wish you had forgotten) and the *Non-Essential Jim Haynes* (20 songs you wish you had never heard) – sounds slightly mad but it is fun!

The regular games activities, including Ladder Golf, Disc Bowls and Petanque, are the social games, which could result in you winning a gReyVee Award while the *Australian Disc Bowls Championships* are open to everyone but are far more serious in nature. Wagga Caravan Centre sponsors the prize money for the Championships and Disc Bowls International is donating a perpetual trophy. We hope to give this a permanent home in the new ACTA Convention Centre.

The *gReyVee trophies* are also awarded for poetry, instrumental and vocal talent, photography, and textile articles including a Wagga quilt. More complete details later in this program.

Among our dedicated volunteers are the *Crafty Crows* and *Daddy Day Care Woodworkers*. These are unisex activities – don't be shy if you would like to attempt something different, our tutors are very patient. From making your own Wagga-Lele (ukulele) to a bird feeder or scale model car, there are multiple items from which to choose. The Crafty Crows can enhance your skills in art, card making, knitting, crochet and more or you can just bring those UFO's (unfinished objects) and stitch 'n' bitch with other crafty folks.

**Tai Chi** is back to start your day and you can also learn to **hula**, meditate and relax or join our newly formed **Crow Choir**. **Seminars** abound on various topics to extend your knowledge.

The *Little Bus* will be shuttling to town on Thursday and Saturday so you can catch up on shopping, banking, chemist, etc. and on Sunday will do a run to the Miniature Railway and Botanic Gardens. Tickets are available at the Crows Nest Information Desk – the font of all knowledge - if you can't find it in the program, but please check the program first. Any changes to the program will be on a whiteboard at the Admin Office, as shown on your program map.

Thanks to our partners in fun - the *Wagga Wagga City Council* (especially Karly, Matt and Cassie) we appreciate their ongoing cooperation in the tourism area. Thanks also local businesses such as *Snap Printing, Hertz, Daily Advertiser* and *Jaeger's Event Hire* for their support and co-operation and *Wagga Country Music Group, Wagga Men's' Choir* and *Judy Ferguson* for helping create our own Choir.

Thanks to our food vendors and traders who have joined us. It's easy to make excuses for not cooking when you can get quality food at realistic prices. Angelo, the fruit and vegie man, is back again on a couple of days so look out for his table. Milk, bread and papers can be ordered through the Info Desk – cut off 3 pm - for delivery next day.

**Market day stalls** are available for the **Open Day**, either undercover in the Crow Central Marquee or you can bring your own gear. Booking forms at the Crows Nest Info Desk.

**Tony Turner and the ACTA staff** have encouraged us to make their venue the home of Stone the Crows Festival – their co-operation and friendship make it a pleasure to be here. We are excitedly waiting to see how the new Centre progresses and really appreciate the fact that work isn't starting till the day we fly the nest to our various homes.

Thank you to our many ambassadors who have spread the word about what a special and different Festival we have all created together. Your word of mouth advertising is creating an atmosphere that others want to share – we hope to show them how right you were.

Our biggest and most sincere thank you to our wonderful volunteers who donate their time and expertise in so many ways – Stone the Crows Festival could never happen without you. Our special thanks also go to those who have donated hours assisting with pre-event planning. To name any one could be to forget someone, we want you to know how much your efforts are appreciated.

#### **Common Sense**

As always the old Crows say – common sense rules! We haven't got this old without using it. **Don't do anything yourself which you wouldn't want someone you love doing!** 

On arrival you will receive a *name badge*. This is your ticket to everything that happens on site. Your booking payment covers all camp fees and activities (other than charity fund raising, bus tickets, merchandise or materials for craft/woodwork classes). If you don't wear your badge, the BADGE POLICE could spot you and request a gold coin donation towards our charity fund raising.

**Electricity supply to the venue is limited** by the on-site transformer. For those on the limited number of powered sites – please **ONLY ONE APPLIANCE AT A TIME** other than fridges or televisions. **No microwaves or air conditioners** unless you have got the OK sticker from the Admin Office. No Piggy Backing under any circumstances – only one lead per point – no powerboards. If you cause your electrical circuit to be tripped you and everyone on that circuit could be out till someone is available to fix it.

**Generator hours** are 8 am to 11 am and 4 pm to 8 pm if you are not in the specific generator area. **No permanent connection to water taps** – taps/hoses only to be connected while topping up tanks.

**Food, tea and coffee** are available from a select group of vendors in the Food Court. We welcome Ed's Tucker Box back again as well as Ace Coffee who have been with us since the inaugural event. The Wagga Wagga South Lions are assisted by the Australian Motorhoming Lions to make bacon and egg rolls for breakie and also Crow-burgers. Sofia Moore has a yummy variety of spring rolls, curry, noodles and other tempting tastes.

Our general traders are sited not far from the food court. We welcome them too. Please note that Stone the Crows Festival takes no responsibility for any vendor's products or opinions – they are covered by their own insurance at all times.

The Festival is insured but we would ask that you use common sense at all times. If you see an existing or potential problem, please advise our helpers at the Crows' Nest Information Desk or the Crow Admin Office so we can take appropriate action if needed.

Should there be an incident or accident, make sure you report it to either of the same groups. **All Emergency Numbers are on Page 13.** Our qualified *first aiders* are sited right next to the toilets adjacent to the ACTA Club House – Cheryl, Jan, Judith and Julie will be found on channel 12 of your UHF radio. Chief Crow Chrissy is next door, so in case of emergency these are your best contacts. Site numbers 123, 122 and 124.

The site has been laid out to make the most of the areas available, taking into account the length of vehicles and the desire of groups to be sited together. If you detach your car, please make sure it is parked off roadways and that you *drive slowly* around the site 5 km is preferred – 10 km max on two way roads

Consult your map, as most roads are one way except Crow Road, which is the major two-way road. This is to alleviate vehicle traffic and make the venue safer for pedestrian traffic. The *entry and exit gate will be via Tasman Road* at all times once everyone is on site. Copland Street gate will be for emergency use only. Please *note the assembly areas* on your map *in case of emergency. For night time activities, PLEASE TAKE YOUR OWN TORCH* so you can return to your site in safety.

**Mobile phones** – please turn off all devices during workshops, seminars, talks, classes and entertainment shows and concerts. Put it onto vibrate if you are expecting a call.

**Dog/cat owners** please act responsibly. If you noted bringing a pet on your booking form, you will get a dispenser and roll of doggy bags on arrival – please use them at the appropriate times.

*Our helpers are all volunteers* - we really value their assistance. Please be patient, show them due respect and how much we appreciate them.

So far we have managed with the absolute minimum of rules and regulations – let's all try to keep it that way please.

### The Australian Disc Bowls Championships

Once again thanks to Wagga Caravan Centre for sponsoring the prize money for this Championship event. At the conclusion of the Championships, Disc Bowls International will be creating a perpetual trophy with plaques showing the names of winners of each of the five categories.

Competition will be for

Ladies Singles - Men's Singles Mixed Doubles

Mixed Triples Ladies - Mixed Triples Mens

The Champion Lady and Man will play off for the overall Champion.

Rules are as per the rules for social disc bowls on page 63 of this program.

All games will be played with the disc bowls sets provided which include twelve discs, standard court, pegs for corners and a lawn bowls jack. Measuring tapes will be available from the organisers should there be a dispute on distance. The umpire's decision is final in all games.

Singles, doubles and triples categories will be held over two games arenas with multiple courts in use at any one time. The Chief Umpire's decision is final for the Championship event. Preliminary rounds will commence at 8.30 am on Saturday April 15 with Mixed Doubles. Start times of other categories will be advised on the grounds on Saturday morning at the Games Arena and Information Desk.

Quarter finals and semi finals will be played on Sunday April 16 with the finals of each section and the overall championship playoff being part of the Open Day festivities on Monday April 17. Presentation of winners will be held at 7 pm on Monday night in the Crow Central Marquee.

Social Disc Bowls for gReyVee awards will be held on Thursday April 13. Experienced players would be welcome to have a practice whilst assisting the novices. We would like to give novices the opportunity to enjoy the game and become addicted as so many of us are. Just turn up for the social games - come and have a laugh and enjoy the day!

#### **ACTIVITIES**

**Crafty Crows** will be giving an assortment of classes for those creative folk. Samples will be available on Tuesday for viewing when you book your spot in the class. Kit prices vary depending on class, please pay your tutor. You have a choice of *cards* to create, *Hungarian crochet, knitting, a bowl using recycled cards, finger pin cushion, jewellery and more*. If the choice is too hard, bring your Unfinished Objects (UFO's) and join in *Stitch 'n' Bitch* for the company and knowledge sharing. See page 60.

**Rugs, Beanies and Scarves** – if you have been creating any of these items once again our end donation point is the Salvation Army for distribution to the homeless. Cash donations to the Ukulele and other Buskers on Easter Monday will also be handed on to the local branch.

**Daddy Day Care** – This year the team have a few specials for you to construct. For starters, there is a limited edition of the *Wagga-Lele* an actual playable ukulele made of claret ash and lacewood timbers, as well as the *Cr-Uke*, which is a ukulele shaped happy hour tray. *Paradise Boxes*, principally from recycled cypress pine after the Black Saturday bushfires with a choice of embellishments, plus *bird feeders, scale model cars* and more. If that's not your scene, what about *Pen Turning, Whip Making, Wood Carving and Scroll Sawing*? Tools to assist will be available to share but are not part of the kit. See page 57 for more.

**Trivia Quiz** – create a table of 8 to 10 people (maximum), select a team name and lodge your team at the Crows' Nest by Friday 2 pm. In the spirit of fun, naturally no smartphone or iPad or tablet help allowed! Brenda offered to assist, so guess what – she's the Quiz Master this year!

**Euchre** – Last year, Lesley foolishly said, "I know how to run a euchre tournament." So the Chief Crows said, "Thank you you're it!" If you would like to learn the basics to participate there will be a session on Friday at 12.30 pm and then you can play on Friday night in the Clubhouse.

**Tai Chi** – Rosalie will start your day peacefully at 8 am on Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday in the Club House. Try and see - It's gentle exercise for our age group!

**The Crow Choir** – the lovely Judy (associated with the Wagga Wagga Choir) has offered to come and help start our own Crow Choir. All voice types are welcome and we are excited to see this as an ongoing addition to our program. So if singing is your thing, please come along each day at 2 pm to the Club House.

**Seminars and Talks** – free for all attendees. Whilst we appreciate the time our speakers are donating, the opinions are their own and not necessarily those of the Festival organisers or helpers. Please ensure you turn your phones off or onto vibrate. More detailed information on the topics later in this program.

**Music Tuition for Ukulele and Guitar –** Rob Nichols and helpers will hold several sessions for various levels of expertise – consult the seminar information and the timetable to see which is most suitable for you.

**Walk Up Poetry Sessions** – Wednesday/Friday/Saturday/Sunday at 11.30 am. John Seers and Paul Dunell will host poets who perform for their own and our enjoyment.

**gReyVee Poetry awards** - Prizes for best humorous and best serious rhymed verse performances. Competition held in Squawkers' Tent on open day Monday starting at 8.30 am.

To enter please fill in a registration form available at Crow Central Marquee on your arrival, or later at the Information Desk.

**Talent Quest auditions** for vocal, instrumental, group and ukulele sections will be held during the Festival. Depending on number of entries there may be heats during the week before the final on Sunday night. To enter the Talent Quest, please fill in a registration form including your name and phone number – it is available at Crow Central Marquee on your arrival, or later at the Information Desk. Entries close at 10 am Saturday so we can sort the order of performers.

**Playing days** – *Petanque* on Wednesday – *Social Disc Bowls* on Thursday, *Ladder Golf* Friday, with all games playing through to the finals. Presentation of the gReyVee awards will take place on the night the finals are played.

The *Australian Disc Bowls Championships* begin on Saturday at 8.30 am and continue through to happy hour. They will recommence on Sunday at the same time. Finals will be held on open day Monday, commencing at 10 am. Presentation of Awards and prize money 7 pm Monday night in the Crow Central Marquee. Thanks to Wagga Caravan Centre for again sponsoring the prize money and to Disc Bowls International for the offer of a perpetual trophy which will be designed in time for next year.

Disc Bowls and Petanque (a form of boule) are mixed teams - no restrictions on number of males or females (except that each team must include at least one man and one woman), maybe friends, other club members, even someone you just met - your choice how you make up your team. Referees and scorers will be required, so if you're not playing you might like to help if you know the rules.

**Ladder Golf** – again mixed triples, any combination but must include both female and male. This is not athletic but definitely skill. Again you need to come up with a team name. It's really fun for all comers.

For the above games, **registrations** will be taken at the Crows' Nest Information Desk **all day Tuesday and up to 2 pm the day before the game**, so the draws can be prepared.

All rules for the three games are on pages 63 to 65 of this program.

**Stoning The Crows** is unique to our Festival and will be conducted on Monday afternoon. It simply requires accuracy and the ability to hit a target. Enter on the day – male and female sections. As the crows are made of corrugated iron and the 'stone' is a tennis ball, we guarantee no birds will be hurt during this game, unless we have a wayward throw hitting a human!

**Open Day** – Stone the Crows Festival will be open to the public on Monday April 17. Please ensure your vehicle and belongings are secure if you're not around – not that we expect anything but it's better to be safe.

Market stalls available for attendees, as well as locals. Your choice is undercover in the various marquees or out on the grounds with your own equipment. Very limited tables are available in the undercover areas so get in early if you want one. Booking forms are available at the Crows Nest Information Desk or see Noel and Ann on registration day.

Buskers are welcome – once again any busking donations will be given with the rugs, beanies and scarves to the Salvation Army for their work with the homeless.

**Food Court** – Food and drink vendors are on site covering a variety of mouth-watering tucker opportunities as well as tea, coffee and ice cream. This is situated on the bitumen area to the west of the Club House.

**General traders** will also be sited to the west of the Club House offering a variety of articles.

**The Little Bus will** pick up passengers near the Admin Office between 10.30 am and 3.30 pm on the half hour (or as close thereto as traffic permits) on Thursday and Saturday with the destination Market Place Shopping complex. On Sunday there will be runs to the Miniature Railway and Botanic Gardens. Tickets can be purchased at the Crows Nest Info Desk by \$2 donation each way - proceeds to our charity fundraising.

**"For Sale" Window** – If you have something to sell, please tape the notice to the glass doors on the northern side of the Clubhouse. Make sure you put your phone number on your for sale notice.

**Shoppa-Dockets** – So we can gauge our contribution to the local economy, please put your dockets (or amounts you spend written on paper if you wish to keep the docket or didn't get one) with your name and phone number in the box at the Crows Nest Info Desk.

**Shoppa-Dockets Prize draw Monday night from the barrel – it could be you** who wins the hamper of local produce, wine and chocolates courtesy Wagga Wagga City Council.

**Merchandise** –a great variety of items are available from the Crows Merchandise Shop, which will be open from 10.30 am to 2.30 pm daily. There are some limited edition 5<sup>th</sup> birthday items and specials!

**Games equipment** – Petanque, ladder golf and disc bowls are available for sale with collection the day after the game is completed. Limited numbers of each – please book the item of your choice and pay at the Merchandise Shop. We do have credit card facilities for your convenience.

The **Crow Administration office** will be open 10 am to 4.30 pm for any queries that can't be answered by the Info Desk or other helpers.

**Bookings for 2018** will open on Easter Sunday at 10.30 am. *Powered sites will be allocated on a first in basis.* Flyers with full details of the entertainment will be available on Friday and Saturday's night preview held in the Crow Central Marquee at 7.30 pm. Another fantastic lineup of professional entertainers and poets are confirmed for our sixth Festival in 2018 – so book early! Sites are only allocated when full payment is made.

#### **Ecumenical Church Services** will be held over the weekend

- **Good Friday** 30 minute reflective service around the theme of love and self-sacrifice.
- **Easter Saturday** A special service for those who may or may not believe in God; in particular for those who have endured suffering that appears to have no purpose. All welcome but if you are hurting and angry, this is especially for you.
- **Easter Sunday** A service of joy and hope. Keeping hope alive in the midst of a world going mad.

#### **Darren Carr**

Darren Carr is back by popular demand. He is recognised in the entertainment industry as Australia's best Ventriloquist and a brilliant comic entertainer.

He always delivers an appropriate and entertaining show and has been honoured with numerous awards including 'Australian Performer of the Year' and a swag of 'Mo' awards. He has twice appeared as a headliner at the International Ventriloquist Convention in the USA and has appeared on Channel 9's 'Footy Show', the Comedy Channel's 'Stand Up Australia', CBS '60 Minutes' and made a huge impact on 'Australia's Got Talent'.

Darren is the son of show biz legend and piano wizard Warren Carr, who many of us may remember from his hits of the 1960s. At the tender age of eight, Darren started playing with dolls and talking to himself. Luckily for him, coming from a show business background, this was not only considered to be quite normal, but actually encouraged. These peculiar traits were not the result of 'too much chlorine in the gene pool', but his fascination with the art of ventriloquism.

He has gone on to be become not only the best ventriloquist Australia has produced, but also one of the funniest comedians to grace the stage here, or anywhere else. 'I'm going to sit near the door, so I can get out quietly," said one regular to the Festival. Two hours later he was still sitting there and laughing so much he was crying. That's how good Darren really is!

## Mike McClellan

When Song and Danceman was released in 1974 Mike McClellan was already an established performer on the acoustic music scene. That song topped the charts bringing him national recognition and a following that has remained loyal to his



highly personal brand of music for over 40 years. For those who had already experienced his talent his first hit single did no more than reinforce what they already knew: that he was one of the best songwriters to emerge from this country in many years and among its most talented singer/guitarists.

Tours with such performers as Roger Miller, Melanie, Dr. Hook, Spike Milligan, The Hollies and Leo Kottke expanded his audience even further and he earned rave reviews for his capacity to hold his own in the company of such internationally recognised stars. That recognition took a giant leap forward when Rick Nelson recorded one of his most acclaimed songs, *Rock'n Roll Lady*, in 1975 and John Farnham covered *Saturday Dance*.

Mike was, for 6 years, a senior tutor at the CMAA Country Music Academy in Tamworth and is a Senior Visiting Fellow at the Australian International Conservatorium of Music where he taught a course in song writing. Ironically, after many, many years his original training as a schoolteacher is being put to good use once again and his song writing workshops have become an important part of his creative life.

A regular at the Australian Folk Festival in Canberra, we are sure you will come away a fan of this legendary performer's music, if you're not already!

#### **Marcus Holden**

Marcus is an incredible musician with many strings to his bow – soloist – composer – producer – multi-instrumentalist.

He performs and records with a variety of groups

Trained as classical violinist from the age of 8, Marcus has developed skills as a multi-instrumentalist, playing mandolin, guitar, banjo, cittern, tenor guitar, dobro, all the members of the bowed string instrument family and even the saw. He has appeared at major festivals around the world, major events such as World Expo and venues such as the Lincoln Centre in New York and the Sydney Opera House.

Apart from playing anything from Gypsy, folk, country, jazz to classical and string arranging form quartet to full orchestra, Marcus has worked in collaboration with some of Australia's greats and international artists including Doug Ashdown, Graeme Connors, Jimmy Barnes, Jenny Morris, John Williamson, Richard Clapton, Ross Wilson, Smokey Dawson and Wayne Horsburgh – and that's just for starters.

He plays many styles of music including Jazz, Folk, Country, Blues and Classical as a soloist and as a member of many groups. He has participated in excess of 500 recordings throughout Australia and overseas.


# Jackie Kerin and Sarah DePasquale

# **Bill Daglish**

Born in Newcastle upon Tyne, England in 1953, he migrated with his family to Australia in October 1964

He grew up in a talented family with his mother, father and brother singing at Scottish social events. After his father died he joined his



mother on occasion singing Scottish ballads and popular 60's hits. He entered many talent quests at various hotels in the area but never pursued his talent.

After his mother passed away, he gave up singing to raise his family. Bill worked a variety of jobs starting as a plasterer, truck driver, printer, office manager, chemical plant operator then finally as a warehouse supervisor.

It wasn't until he neared retirement that he returned to singing. With his second wife Lyn by his side they purchased a motorhome and travelled Victoria, Bill singing at rallies and entertaining the Grey Nomads.

His break finally came after entering the talent quest at Stone The Crows Festival in Wagga Wagga. With the help of sound genius Grant Luhrs and the encouragement of Jim Haynes, he has recorded an album of easy listening classic ballads with which you can sing along.



# Jim Haynes OAM

Jim has recorded for *Festival, EMI, Sony, ABC Music* and his own label, *Singabout Australia*. He had a number one hit with *Since Cheryl Went Feral* and a national hit with *Don't Call Wagga Wagga Wagga* and toured his own show as well as touring with Slim Dusty, Frank Ifield, Beccy Cole, Melinda Schneider, Adam Brand and others.



The son of British migrants, Jim taught in schools and universities in NSW and Britain, has two masters' degrees in literature, from New England University and the University of Wales, and is the author of 24 books.

Jim's book, *Australia's Best Unknown Stories*, made it into the top ten best-seller list for his publishers Allen & Unwin. He was Writer in Residence at Charles Sturt University in 2011 and taught writing, performance skills and song writing for The Arts Council of NSW, University of New England, SA Arts Council and Australian Performing Rights Association.

Jim originated morning shows at the Tamworth Festival and celebrated thirty-one years at the festival this year by staging the 'LAST EVER' *Jim Haynes Morning Variety Shows* - which were sold out. His first gold stage suit, and his memorabilia from 30 years as an entertainer, are now in the Australian Country Music Foundation Museum in Tamworth.

Jim has a weekly spot on Macquarie radio network and was given Honorary Life Membership of the Country Music Association in 2014 and awarded the **Order of Australia Medal** in 2016, 'for service to the performing arts as an entertainer, author, broadcaster and historian'. Jim had the idea for a Wagga Wagga based Festival that became *Stone The Crows* and is in charge of entertainment and bounces new ideas off Chrissy to see how they can come to fruition.

## **Grant Luhrs**

In 2012 Grant was given the Australia Day Award of 'Citizen of the Year for Wagga Wagga'. He has lived in the city since 1982, taught sound engineering at Charles Sturt University and written and produced many radio and TV jingles in his Flying Fox Studio, as well as engineering albums of band music, country music and show tunes.



With the *Chook Raffle Band* he has performed all around Australia and also in China at *The Nanning International Folk Festival* 2007 and the *Zhangjiajie International Festival* in 2009.

Born and raised in Griffith, Grant trained as a mathematics teacher, but AFL football and wanderlust took him to Perth, where he played professional AFL, and Darwin, where he survived Cyclone Tracey before returning home to the Riverina. By 1981 Grant was singing and writing songs seriously and making a living doing it.

Best known for songs like *Full Moon Tonight* and *Nude Boot Scootin'*, which have featured on ABC Radio's program *Australia All Over*, Grant also wrote many other songs including *One Foot in the Bidgee*, and *Let's Get a Cow*, which has been recorded by Chad Morgan, the Victorian Police Band. Lester Coombes and the Queensland Symphony Orchestra!

In 1997 Grant performed *Nude Boot* at the River Island Nature Retreat, where 64 nude line dancers created the world's First Nude Boot Scooting Record, which was included in the *Guiness Book of Records*!

Grant is the vital 'Local Chief Crow' in the *Stone the Crows* organisation looking after local contacts and relationships as well as being our sound engineer and liaison officer.

We are delighted to welcome Rod (and his *big bugger* truck) back to the Festival. Last year, his talks attracted more than 400 of our flock to learn about road safety from a truckle's point of view. If you don't attend any other talk this Festival, try to come and listen to Rod – it is a real education!

Rod first became involved in road safety nearly ten years ago now, following one of those days on the road, when you really wonder where people get their licences, out of WeetBix packets or do they simply not care about their lives or those of anyone else? As the driver of a BIG B-DOUBLE that will be on site (26 metres in length and it's done over 500,000 kms around Australia) he is an ideal, experienced person to give you an insight into the horrors of crashes, near misses and disasters which should not have happened if other motorists understand how trucks like his operate, their stopping distance weight and more. This talk could save your life or that of someone you care about - that's why it is on twice – Friday and again on Saturday.

#### Let's Talk it Over - Barbara Bell

Sometimes there are problems that get us down and we feel that there is no answer to them. Anxiety and depression can set in. Learn about depression and anxiety and some of the ways to combat these illnesses. One way to help you is to talk about what is troubling you and this group meeting may help you. Anything that is said will be confidential. Come along and we can Talk It Over Together.

#### Wrapping up Poetry - Paul Dunnell

This session will answer any questions you may have about what we have covered and address aspects that have arisen as we went along with our poetic journey – looking at poems that work and appeal to our senses. We will look at some of the poems that Jim used in his session "How Poems Work" and draw it all together.

## Books For Young People - The Authors' Perspective - Jackie and Jim

#### **Games Rules**

**DISC BOWLS -** Players must throw discs with both feet contained within the width of the sidelines AND from BEHIND the baseline of the court. A foot out-side the width of the sidelines, OR ON or OVER the rope (Foot Fault) renders that disc 'Out of Play'.

A disc that rolls outside the court but comes to rest fully or partially inside the court is deemed 'Out of Play'. A disc that rests against, or lands under or over the perimeter of the rope is deemed 'Out of Play'.

A disc thrown out of sequence is deemed 'Out of Play'. Any disc 'Out of Play' shall be removed from the court by the umpire before the next disc is thrown, and re-place any other disturbed discs to (as close as possible) their former position prior to the shot. This also relates to the 'Kitty' if disturbed, and to be replaced to former position. The 'kitty' is deemed to be 'in play' whilst the portion of its surface upon which it rests is inside the court. The team, which causes the kitty to be knocked out, loses that end, and three points are awarded to the opposing team. All discs 'in play' must remain where they land until the end is scored.

When the twelve discs have been thrown, 'Skippers' only are permitted within the boundary of the court to decide which team's disc is closest to the 'kitty', and the number of shots (points). If the Skippers cannot mutually decide, the Umpire measures the shot and advises the scorer of the result. This procedure continues until six ends are completed. The team with the highest points score is declared the winner.

If, on the completion of six ends the scores are equal (tied) the Umpire will place the kitty' centrally at the ¾ point of the court. The 'SKIPPERS ONLY' throw in the playoff, with three discs each. The Umpire tosses a coin to decide which player leads off. The 'Skippers' throw alternatively until their three discs are thrown, to decide the winning team.

Social Disc Bowls for gReyVee awards will be held on Thursday April 13. We would love the championship players to use this as a practice and help our team teach novices how to enjoy this game as much as you do.

**PETANQUE** or boules is played outdoors on any reasonably firm surface. Both teams select their boules and toss a coin to see which side goes first.

The team that wins the coin toss chooses the starting location and then selects one of their players to throw out the jack. A circle indicates the starting location 14 to 20 inches in diameter and at least three feet from any obstacles. Once the circle is drawn, the player then stands with both feet inside the circle and throws the jack. The jack can be thrown in any direction but must land within 20 to 30 feet of the starting circle and three feet from any obstacle.

All boules must be thrown from within the starting circle and with both feet on the ground. The player attempts to throw the boule so that it lands, as close to the jack as possible it is okay to hit the jack. The player must remain inside the circle until the boule has landed. A player from the opposing team then steps into the circle and attempts to land his boule closer to the jack even if it means knocking his opponents out of the way. The boule closest to the jack leads or is said to be 'holding the point.' The other team must continue throwing boules until they take the lead or run out of boules. There is no order that team members must follow when throwing their boules however, they must only throw their own boules, and they must go one at a time from within the starting circle. If they take the lead, the other team then tries to recover by landing a lead boule.

Once a team has used all its boules, the other side is allowed to throw the rest of its boules. When all boules are thrown, the points are counted. The team that has the boule closest to the jack wins the round. In addition, they also receive a point for each boule that is closer to the jack than their opponent's closest boule. Only one team scores points during a round.

Once the points are counted, the next round begins with previous round's winners drawing a new starting circle. This starting circle is drawn around the final position of the jack in the previous round. The winning team then selects a player to toss out the jack from this new starting circle and then throw out the first boule.

The first team to earn a total of 13 points wins the game. There are not a required number of rounds that must be played.

**LADDER GOLF** - The game of Ladder Golf is played in rounds and typically a coin toss will determine which player goes first. Each player has three bolas and must throw all three of their bolas before another player can go. The goal is to get the bolas to catch on one of the rungs, the top rung is worth three points, second is worth two and the bottom rung is worth one point. There is no set way to throw a bola, therefore a play may toss anyway he/she likes and can even bounce a bola on the ground. The player with the most points at the end of the round gets to throw first the next round. After a round is played, points are totalled. Whichever bolas are still hanging are awarded points. It is okay, encouraged even, to knock the bolas of other players off the rungs, in that case, those bolas do not count as points.

The first player to get to 21 points exactly is the winner. If a player goes over 21 points, the points they earned during that round do not count. In the event of a tie, each team with 21 points will play as many overtime rounds until one team gains two points at the end of the round. The two point rule only applies in overtime rounds.

Stone the Crows Festival is played with three players with each player, alternating turns each round. All team must be mixed, eg 2 females, 1 male or 2 males, 1 female. Scorer is adjudicator if any disputes during round.

## **Ladder Golf Etiquette**

Unlike the actual game of Golf, the gentleman's game, Ladder Golf, encourages remarks, sounds and/or movements to distract your opponents. However, touching a player or their bolas is against the rules. No player can walk to the ladder before the completion of each round.

At Stone the Crows Festival, there could be up to 50 plus teams and 5 rounds should you get to the final. If we have an odd number of teams at the end of each round, a new team can be added to make an even number of teams for the next round. This new team can be made up of players that have been eliminated in previous rounds but not the same members of that losing team.

Should more than one team nominate to go into the next round, a 1 bola throw by each player with team total determining which team advances to next round. Have fun and enjoy.

## HISTORY OF STONE THE CROWS FESTIVAL and gReyVees AWARDS

**Jim Haynes** is responsible for the idea that became the **Stone The Crows Festival**. Among Jim's other ideas over the years have been the creation of morning shows at the *Tamworth Country Music Festival*, the *Australian Bush Laureate Awards*, the school show 'Singabout Australia' and the musical play 'Voices From Gallipoli'.

Jim's connection with Wagga Wagga is that he wrote and recorded three songs about the city, including 'Don't Call Wagga Wagga Wagga' which was a hit about twenty years ago. He was also writer in residence at Charles Sturt University and often recorded at **Grant Luhr's** 'Flying Fox' studio in Wagga Wagga.

'I always thought Wagga Wagga was the perfect place for a festival,' Jim said, 'and the idea had been floating around in my mind for a long time.'

**Grant** has lived in Wagga Wagga since 1982 when he established Flying Fox Recording Studio. He has been involved in the local arts scene and festivals and events in Wagga Wagga for three decades, helped many local artists and groups, taught sound engineering at Charles Sturt University and works part time at ABC Riverina Radio. He was made the Citizen of the Year in 2012 for his charity and community work.

**Chrissy Eustace** met Jim when he entertained at a motorhome rally more than 10 years ago. Chrissy's job was Official Photographer but she offered to help Jim with his CD sales and after the show they got chatting, the rest is history.

Chrissy and husband Bob tried all types of RV's before settling on motorhomes. She started the 'Craft Barn' in 2003, an activity which continues at CMCA rallies and was director of Casino Village Resort for four years where she created events such as the National Camp Oven Festival and the Bushman's Heritage Festival still going after 12 years. It was after one of these events that she and Jim threw around the idea of holding a Festival. In 2010 it became a serious discussion which resulted in Stone the Crows being created.

'Grant and I had discussed the festival idea many times,' Jim says. 'We knew Wagga was the perfect place but until Chrissy came along, with her grey nomad connections, to actually do all the work and get things started – it was just an idea, now it's a reality!'

Chrissy explained, "Stone the Crows is almost a year round job for a week of fun." When not "crowing", she is involved in the local community as a charter member of the local Rotary Club organising the annual Art Show and as a Director of the Kinglake Ranges Foundation (which continues to distribute grants to bushfire community groups). She maintains her sanity by tutoring at Stitch Witches Patchwork group.

"The guys and I are great mates plus we work really well together, bouncing ideas off each other, some come to fruition, others don't. We all have the same enthusiasm to keep the Festival a vibrant living entity. The encouragement we receive from our grey nomad flock makes all the hard work worthwhile. With our team of volunteers, we have put together something really special and that was acknowledged with our Bronze Award at the 2014 NSW Inland Tourism Awards, behind two really established events, Tamworth Country Music Festival and the Canowindra Balloon Challenge and Festival,' she added.

'We don't want to be the biggest Festival in the world – we want to be the one that people love, the one they want to come back to year after year and most importantly, something they will feel proud to be part of when they talk to their mates and others.'

So to everyone who has worked with us to create the magic which is Stone the Crows – **thank you** – keep enjoying it and spreading the word!
